LISTEN TO THE ACS

On your fire radio scanner or HAM radio, you can listen to the LAFD-ACS net on Monday evenings at 19:30 (7:30 p.m. PST). The 2-meter frequency is 147.300 MHz. The 220 band frequency is 224.680 MHz. Any licensed amateur is invited to check-in as a visitor.

The LAFD invites you to volunteer for the Auxiliary Communications Service

The Emergency Operations Organization of the City of Los Angeles has designated the Los Angeles Fire Department to manage its amateur radio program under the Auxiliary Communication Service agreement with the State Office of Emergency Services.

LAFD ACS volunteers¹ provide essential communications support during emergencies and LAFD-supported public service events. The ACS Radio Club has a mentoring program designed to assist CERT and community members who wish to become licensed with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) so they can contribute even more to The Fire Department. Classes are planned for the last quarter of 2004.

Our organizational structure is modeled after that of the LA City Fire Department and we follow the SIMS Incident Command System. The ACS has a General Staff, Division Leaders and Battalion Leaders and a general membership, and our communication volunteers. All ACS drills and activities aim to incorporate CERT and community groups so we may work well together during an actual catastrophic event.

ACS Participants volunteer at:

- ***Quarterly ACS Drills*** simulate disaster response to earthquake, terrorist attack, brushfires, floods, and other possible calamities.
- ***City Wide Drills*** test Ham Radio Simplex and Family Radio Service (FRS) communications abilities, among other things.
- ***LAFD-supported Community Activities*** such as the March of Dimes Walk, Hollywood Christmas Parade, and Municipal Elections.
- ***ACS Radio Club Meetings***, which include guest speakers, radio education, mentoring for beginners, and more!

¹ ACS members are subject to a background check and must meet the qualifications as a Los Angeles City Volunteer under the Mayor's Office Volunteer Bureau's requirements. They also must meet the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services (OES) Disaster Worker requirements.
